

Google Books (<https://books.google.com>) provides access to digitized books from the convenience of your compute or mobile device. Many of the books are freely accessible (meaning in the public domain), while you may have limited “preview” access to others



- Full View.** A book marked **Read** is available for free. According to Google if “the book is out of copyright, or if the publisher or author has asked to make the book fully viewable. The **Full View** allows you to view any page from the book, and if the book is in the public domain, you can download, save and print a PDF version to read at your own pace.”
- Limited View.** A book is available in Limited View if “the publisher or author has given us permission, you can see a limited number of pages from the book as a preview.”
- Snippet View.** A book is available in Snippet View which is “like a card catalog, shows information about the book plus a few snippets – a few sentences to display your search term in context.”
- Don’t disregard books listed as Limited or Snippet View.** Very often you can find bits of information related to your search which will help your genealogy research.
- Use My Library in Google Books to create a virtual personalized library.** When you find a book to track in the future, click **Add to my library** in the menu bar at the top of the screen. Note: you must have a Google account in order to use the My Library feature.
- Use WorldCat to access books.** Books can still be accessed through your local public or institutional library. Under **Get this book in print**, select **Find in a Library** which will bring you to WorldCat. Use WorldCat to search for locations to borrow books via inter-library loan.
- Use Advanced Search to find free books.** If your goal is to find books with Full View access that you can download, use the **Advanced Book Search** function and limit your results.
- Access bibliographic information.** Click **About this book** in the left sidebar the scroll to the bottom of the page. You can even export the information to standard formats such as BiBTeX and EndNote.
- Get book in print.** Once you’ve located a book, click **Get this book in print** and select a vendor or locate a library that has the book.
- Search for magazines.** In the **Advanced Book Search** screen, click **Magazines** in the **Content** section to limit your search results to only magazines. Offerings include ALL back issues of **Ancestry** magazine (ended publication in 2010).
