Achieved by Run: Xcopy F:\ E:\ /s/d/y were F: is the Working drive, and E: is the current Backup drive. Note: the Backup drive is only installed on the computer when performing backup, therefore, minimizing the possibility of drive spindle bearing failure.
Second Note: the user needs to thoroughly understand the limitations of this proc
